LEAH GIORGINI, MS, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR: As I reflect on the past year, I am filled with gratitude and pride for the incredible strides ISPS-US has made. In 2024, we hosted our most successful conference to date in Pittsburgh, PA, with packed rooms and high-energy that showcased the strength of our community and the growing momentum behind humane, psychosocial approaches to mental health care.

Our advocacy efforts also took a significant step forward as ISPS-US's Advocacy Committee joined the National Coalition for Mental Health Recovery for a Hill Day in Washington, DC, amplifying the voices of those pushing for transformative change. Education remains a cornerstone of our mission, and this year, we expanded our programming from 11 sessions to 23, including interactive workshops that delved deeply into psychosocial approaches to psychosis

Highlights included our courses "Diverse Psychotherapeutic Approaches to Psychosis" and "Psychosis, Occupation, and the Human Experience: Exploring the Role of Activity, Engagement, and Meaning," developed in partnership with the American Occupational Therapy Association's Community of Practice in Psychosis.

Thank you to everyone who contributed to our movement in 2024. My opportunities to connect with ISPS-US members and supporters continue to inspire and energize me, as we build a brighter future of mental health care together.

EDUCATION

In 2024, ISPS-US achieved remarkable growth in our educational programming, expanding by 109% to offer 23 webinars and workshops that reached over 80,000 people through registered attendance and YouTube views. While increasing education revenue by 66%, we remained committed to accessibility, awarding 988 scholarships for free or heavily discounted attendance.

Our programming covered a wide spectrum of topics, from amplifying marginalized voices in "Beyond the Stereotypes: Homelessness, Community Coercion & Extreme Cases," to exploring innovative perspectives in "New Perspectives on Negative Symptoms: Incorporating Meaning-Centered Approaches and Lived Experience into Clinical Practice," to cutting-edge research with Professor Joanna Moncrieff in "Stopping Long-Term Antipsychotics: Reflections on the RADAR Trial." These sessions reflect our dedication to fostering dialogue, advancing understanding, and empowering our community.

CONFERENCE

The 2024 ISPS-US Conference New Beginnings: Reimagining Psychosis Services & Systems in the US took place from November 1-3rd, 2024 at the University of Pittsburgh and Duquesne University.

The event exceeded all expectations, bringing together nearly 180 in-person attendees and almost as many online. With close to 90 speakers from the US, Canada, and the UK, the event was filled with dynamic discussions, packed breakout sessions, and a renewed sense of energy. Many participants left inspired to continue building connections and advancing advocacy sparked at the conference.

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, we raised \$2,673.59 through our mid-year scholarship campaign, funding 26 free or heavily discounted spaces. This momentum is just the beginning-we're excited to see where it leads next.



CONFERENCE





Over 2024, ISPS-US saw a 21% growth in membership, reflecting our expanding community. Our membership remains diverse, with 32% identifying as low-income or having lived experience. This year, we enhanced opportunities for connection by introducing new member groups, *Spiritual Wellness Conversations* and *Life Writing*, fostering deeper engagement and support. Thank you to our volunteer group facilitators who make these spaces possible.

Before the Deluge is an oil on canvas painting of a streetscape in Corona del Mar, California, where I lived with my father before being re-committed to the Department of State Hospitals in 2008. The painting depicts suburbia on the verge of transition, before real estate speculation transforms quaint bungalows into stylish, expensive, multistory houses, a process that could arguably be described as "psychotic" since it destroys traditional, perfectly habitable homes for structures that often are not suited to the community's scale and also beyond the economic reach of all but the financially very well-off.







In 2024, ISPS-US advanced critical mental health advocacy by endorsing key policy initiatives and engaging directly with policymakers. We signed on to important letters, including the APA Policy and Position Statement on the Use of Seclusion and Restraint: Avoiding Institutional Harm and Promoting Evidence-Based Practices in Psychiatric Settings, as well as the Stop Institutional Child Abuse Act. Additionally, several members of our Advocacy Committee actively participated in Hill Day organized by the National Coalition of Mental Health Recovery, engaging with elected officials on priorities such as expanding non-coercive treatment options, enhancing access to therapy, and including individuals with lived experience in leadership roles.

We are proud of these accomplishments and remain committed to building on these successes to strengthen our advocacy efforts and influence systemic change in mental health care.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

In 2024, ISPS-US increased its gross revenue by \$54,223, a 37.2% rise driven by expanded educational programs and a well-attended conference. Our strengthened relationships with supporters and funders resulted in higher individual giving, increased event sponsorship, and continued foundation contributions, while generous in-kind donations such as free conference space further bolstered our success. It's worth noting that some conference charges from 2023 were processed in 2024, skewing our expenses for this year. However, our revenue growth reflects our expanding impact and organizational sustainability.
